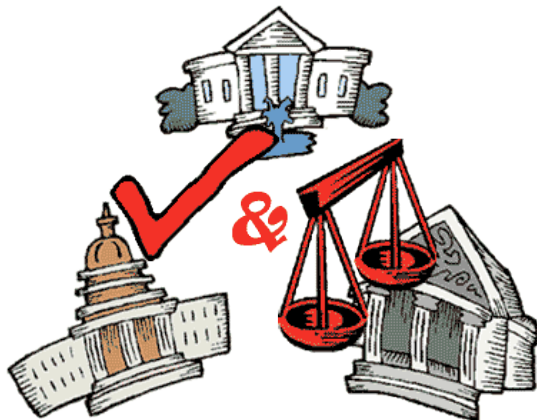


Social Studies

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Language Arts and English

- Write a fully developed narrative using focus, organization, elaboration, and coherence. Write a strong persuasive essay using professional language and overcome audience objections. Research and write informative pieces citing sources correctly. Work will reflect original insights and interpretations and is not merely a summary of the ideas of others. Extended interpretations are not merely stated but developed, making use of concrete examples, textual references, illustrations, and supporting details.
- Edit and revise students' own writings for word choice and organization.
- Build a strong foundation in English conventions.
- Read classic novels, short stories, and poetry in a variety of genres (plays, poetry, and young adult fiction). Explain how the plot and setting contribute to the overall effect of a piece of literature.
- Analyze how characters in literature deal with conflict and solve problems; relate these to real life experiences.
- Written and oral contributions to class will reflect sensitivity to the subject matter and a precision of thought.
- Understand the meaning of stories (moral of the story, theme, and author's point of view on a topic) by interpreting the story elements.
- Final formal oral and written products will reflect thorough preparation, revision, and editing.
- Extended work will reflect creative use of words, ideas, and imagination.
- Extended work will demonstrate a clear understanding of the purpose and limits of a given assignment.

- Engage in service to the community in response to the Gospel call.
- Develop a moral conscience informed by Church teachings.
